It is with great pride that we present this year's Annual Report and recognize the outstanding work of the men and women of the Addison Police Department. The accomplishments highlighted within these pages are the result of professionalism, teamwork, and an unwavering commitment to service.

This year saw measurable progress in public safety. Through focused strategies and proactive policing, motor vehicle thefts decreased by 54 percent, and overall property crime declined by 26 percent. These results reflect not only effective enforcement but also the trust and cooperation of the community we serve.

One of the most significant developments this year was the creation of the Community Response Team (CRT). This team was established to address crime hotspots, apprehend wanted felons, increase neighborhood patrols, and respond to complex homelessness-related issues. The CRT has strengthened our ability to deliver targeted, compassionate, and effective service while remaining visible and engaged within our neighborhoods.

Community engagement remained a cornerstone of our mission in 2025. Our Community Engagement Officer partnered with schools, businesses, and residents to create new programs, events, and initiatives that benefited local children and families in need. These partnerships reinforce the importance of connection, trust, and shared responsibility in maintaining a safe and supportive community.

We also made a strong commitment to the health and well-being of our personnel. Comprehensive annual health screenings and expanded fitness initiatives reinforce our belief that caring for our people is essential to serving our community at the highest level.

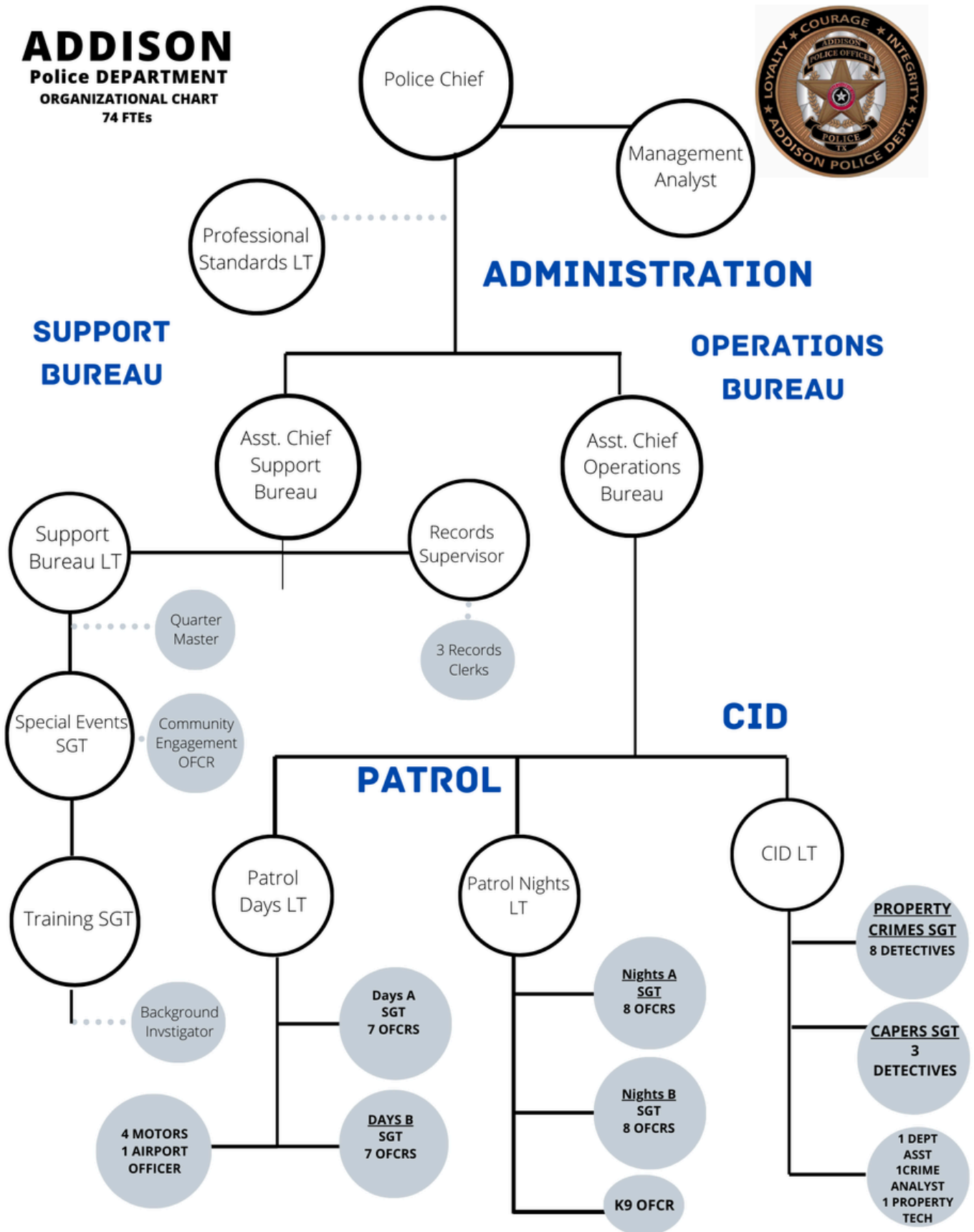

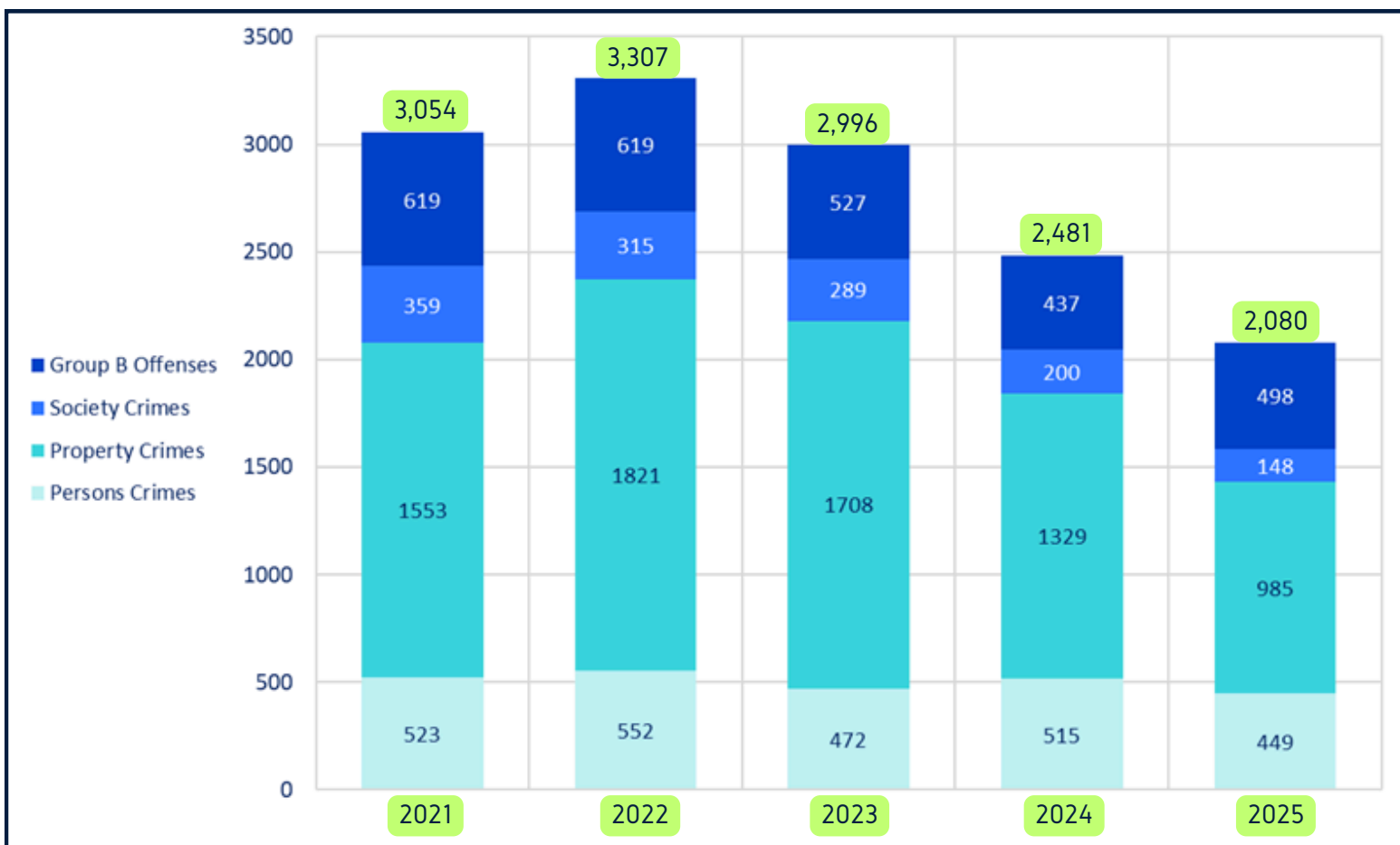


Statistical Review: Crime Over Time

The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) format is the current law enforcement standard for crime statistic reporting set by the FBI. NIBRS categories include 52 Part A major crimes (categorized into crimes against persons, property, and society) and 11 Part B minor crimes. Part B crimes include trespass, loitering, and other disorderly conduct.

In 2025 Addison saw a **16.2% total decrease** in crime from the previous year. Some of most noteworthy decreases include burglary (-29.9%), motor vehicle theft (-54.0%), and theft of motor vehicle parts/accessories (-61.2%). A full 2024-2025 crime rate comparison is on the next page, and clearance rates can be found in the appendix.

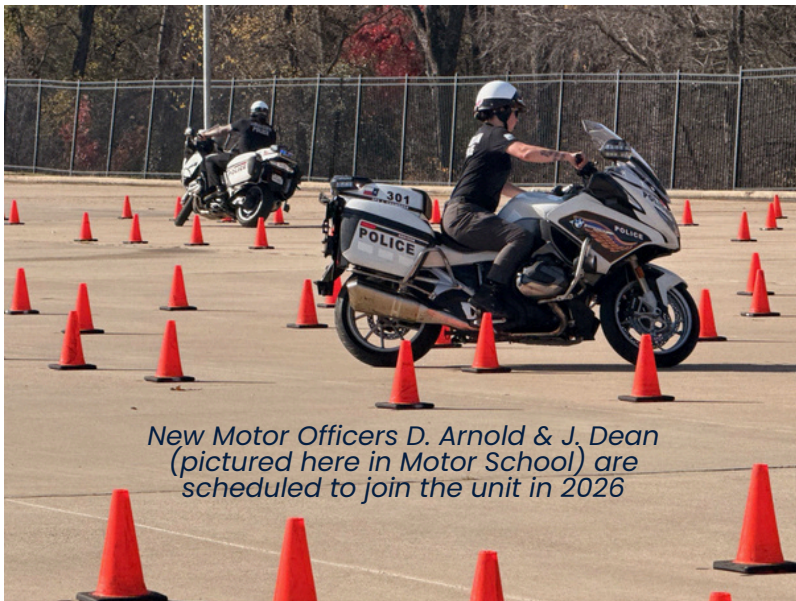

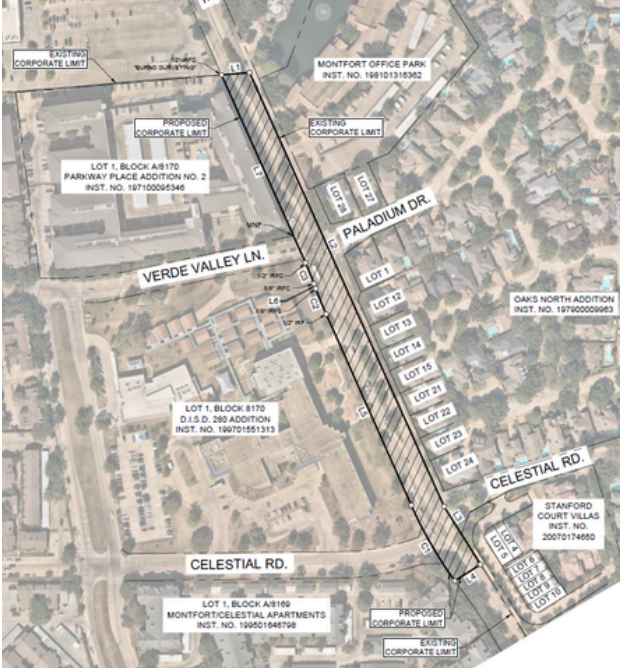

Department Updates



Montfort Dr Expansion:

The Town of Addison acquired approximately two blocks of Montfort Dr from the city of Dallas in late 2025. This will enable our Streets department to improve the intersection traffic control equipment at Paladium Dr and allows our officers to respond to calls for service, crashes, traffic enforcement, and school zone needs.

Our Motor officers would like to remind residents and visitors of two safety concerns on Montfort Dr:

- The speed is only 30 MPH due to blind corners, hills, and road conditions. Patrol officers routinely work traffic enforcement here due to the number of crashes and incidents nearby.
- Parents are not allowed to park in the roadway and walk away from their vehicles to pick up children from school. Due to the danger to surrounding traffic illegally parked cars will be towed.

Community Response Team (CRT):

The Community Response Team was created to make our communities in Addison safer. Specifically, the team accomplishes this goal by having each member patrol our neighborhoods for at least an hour per shift, performing marked or unmarked surveillance in our commercial property crime hotspots, attempting to locate Addison fugitives and regional wanted felons, and responding to calls involving homelessness. The team meets weekly with the intelligence unit to receive trend updates and provide workable leads based on their research.

The unit is currently staffed with two officers and a dedicated sergeant. They have a flexible schedule to accommodate internal and regional proactive law enforcement operations but can primarily be seen in our neighborhoods conducting patrols in the late afternoon. Our CRT sergeant has over 14 years of experience at Addison PD and our three officers selected for the unit have extensive backgrounds in military service, similar units in other law enforcement agencies, police leadership, community outreach, and narcotics interdiction.

Since the unit came online in December 2025, CRT has made two felony narcotics arrests from our hotels and apprehended a serial cosmetics thief responsible for thousands of dollars in loss from our Addison businesses.



Department Updates

TPCA Re-Certification:

Texas Police Chiefs Association (TPCA) accreditation is a voluntary program that evaluates law enforcement agencies against a comprehensive set of over 170 professional standards. Evaluated criteria includes policies and procedures, training, use of force, evidence processing and storage, transparency, public communication, discipline, legal compliance, and overall operations. An agency must demonstrate that it meets or exceeds state standards through documented records, an independent review process, and a thorough re-accreditation evaluation every four years.

The goal of TPCA certification is to show that the agency prioritizes effective delivery of public service and protecting the civil rights of all individuals. It is a way to invite outside subject-matter experts into our department to examine how we operate, evaluate if we are doing things the right way, and offer constructive feedback to improve processes. In 2025 the Addison Police Department successfully completed the TPCA re-accreditation process.



The Addison Police Department's organizational goals, as successfully evaluated by TPCA, include:

- Maintain clear, professional, and up-to-date policies
- Hold ourselves and our employees accountable to recognized best practices
- Invest in proper training and continuous operational improvement
- Conduct ourselves with transparency and professionalism
- Remain committed to ethical and responsible policing

New Health Initiatives:

Physical health assessments: Officers now complete an annual, confidential health screening with zero out-of-pocket cost that includes bloodwork, a stress test, scans, and several thorough exams.

New bulletproof vests: Officers are transitioning to external, load-bearing vests and plate carriers to reduce lower back and hip strain.

1,000 lb club: Employees must lift a combined weight of at least 1,000 lbs between three exercises: bench press, deadlift, and squat. 9 officers completed this challenge, with Motor Officer D. Arnold lifting 1,265 lbs.

APD run team: Employees meet on breaks to run Addison trails. Members of the team completed the Dallas Marathon relay race in December 2025 and the CowTown Half Marathon in Fort Worth in February 2026.



Police Training Review

Each quarter officers attend at least one day of group training on topics including defensive tactics, developing firearms skills, learning about new laws and best practices, training on technology, and pursuit driving.

Yearly staples of our in-service training include Gracie Ground Defense techniques for subjects that are actively, physically resisting arrest while reducing risk of causing injury, a variety of handgun and rifle accuracy techniques, medical training including first aid, CPR, and trauma response, and legal updates including new case laws.

In 2025 our department implemented two robust in-service trainings to compliment new state laws about police officer accountability (ABLE, see below) and thorough active shooter response preparedness (ALERTT). Addison officers completed the first of two sets of ALERTT training in 2025 and completed the second in February 2026.



In 2025 all Addison officers completed ABLE (Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement) training. This is a nationally recognized program aimed to create a culture of intervention to prevent misconduct, avoid use of force mistakes, and promote accountability.

Community Engagement Review



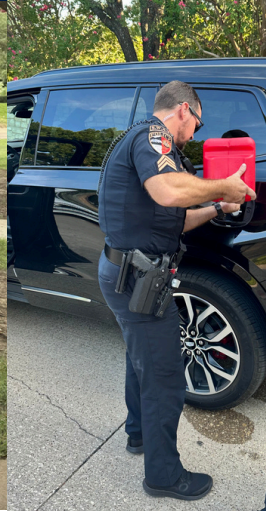
2025 marked a year of growth, outreach, and service for Community Engagement Officer Claustre. He successfully completed 120 hours of training to become a certified Crime Prevention Specialist, enabling him to conduct residential and commercial security surveys for our citizens and local businesses. He completed 6 home surveys in our neighborhoods at no cost to our residents and 3 commercial surveys at a school, hotel, and office.

Throughout the year, Officer Claustre and the Community Engagement team presented at numerous HOA meetings, block parties, and community events, working to strengthen trust, communication, and transparency between law enforcement and the community. They also participated in events, including the Hotdog Social, National Night Out, Halloween Bash, School Career Days, and Touch-a-Truck, fostering meaningful connections with residents of all ages.

In addition to outreach, Officer Claustre coordinated several fundraising efforts and organized a community blood drive, bringing the community together for positive causes. He also formed valuable partnerships with local organizations, including a new collaboration with Target and continuing our strong relationship with Metrocrest Services. This helped make our new Heroes and Helpers event possible and provided holiday gifts to 20 students from George Bush Elementary. To further spread holiday cheer, Officer Claustre also led the Santa's Heroes Drive, assisting six families with fifteen children who were in need of gifts, household items, and clothing during the Christmas season.

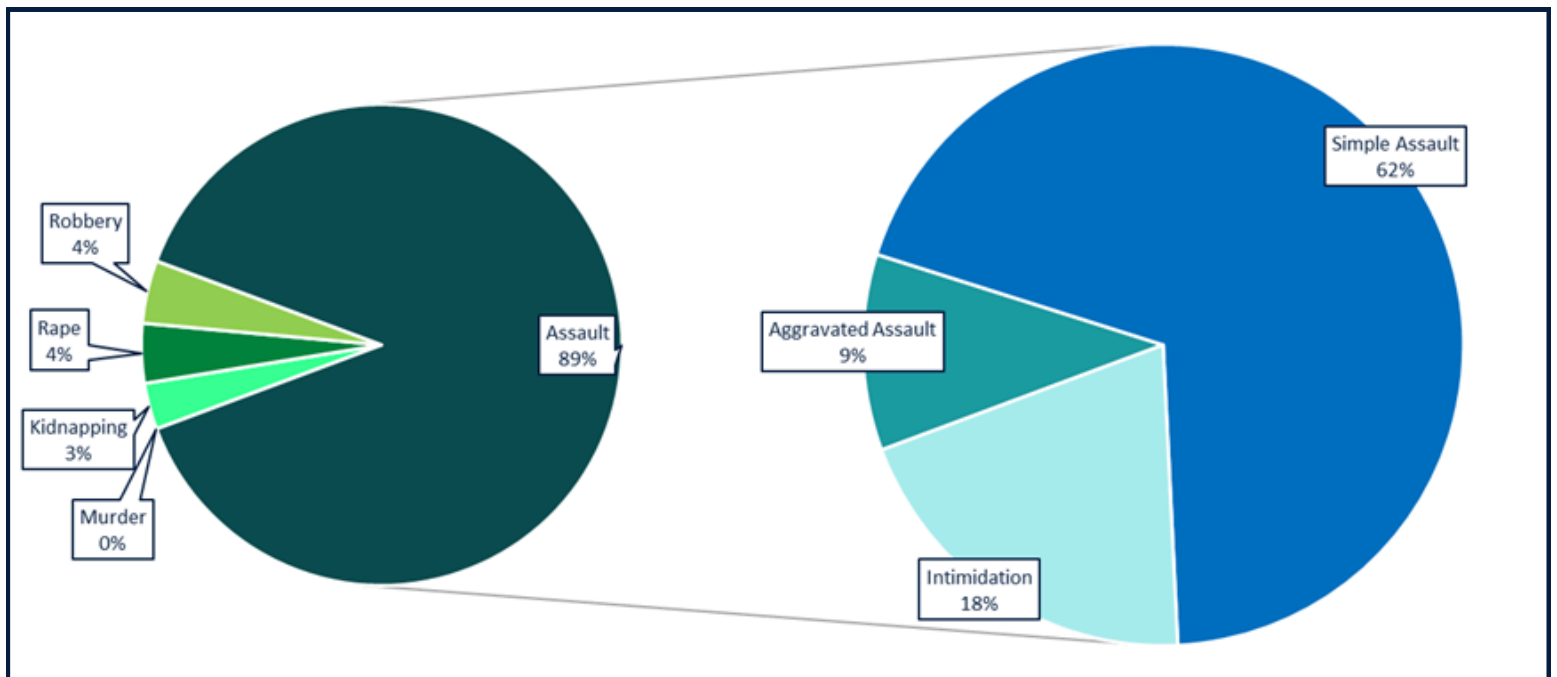

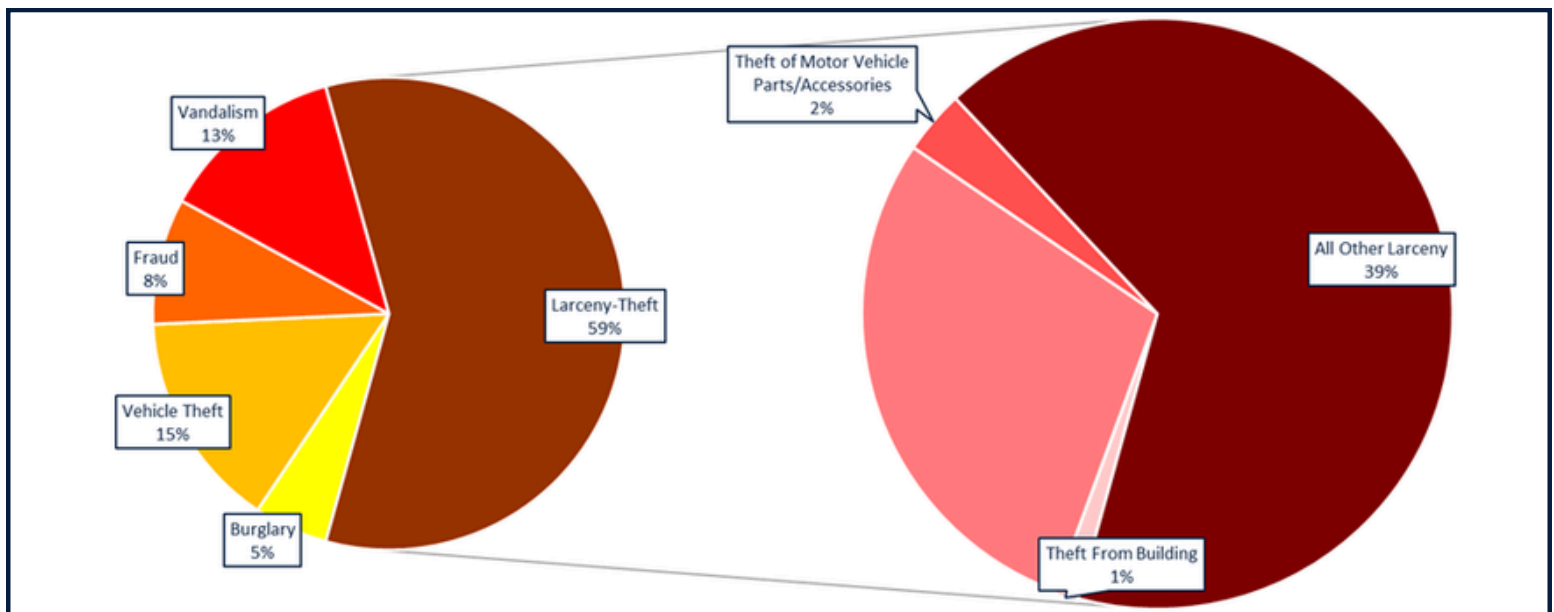

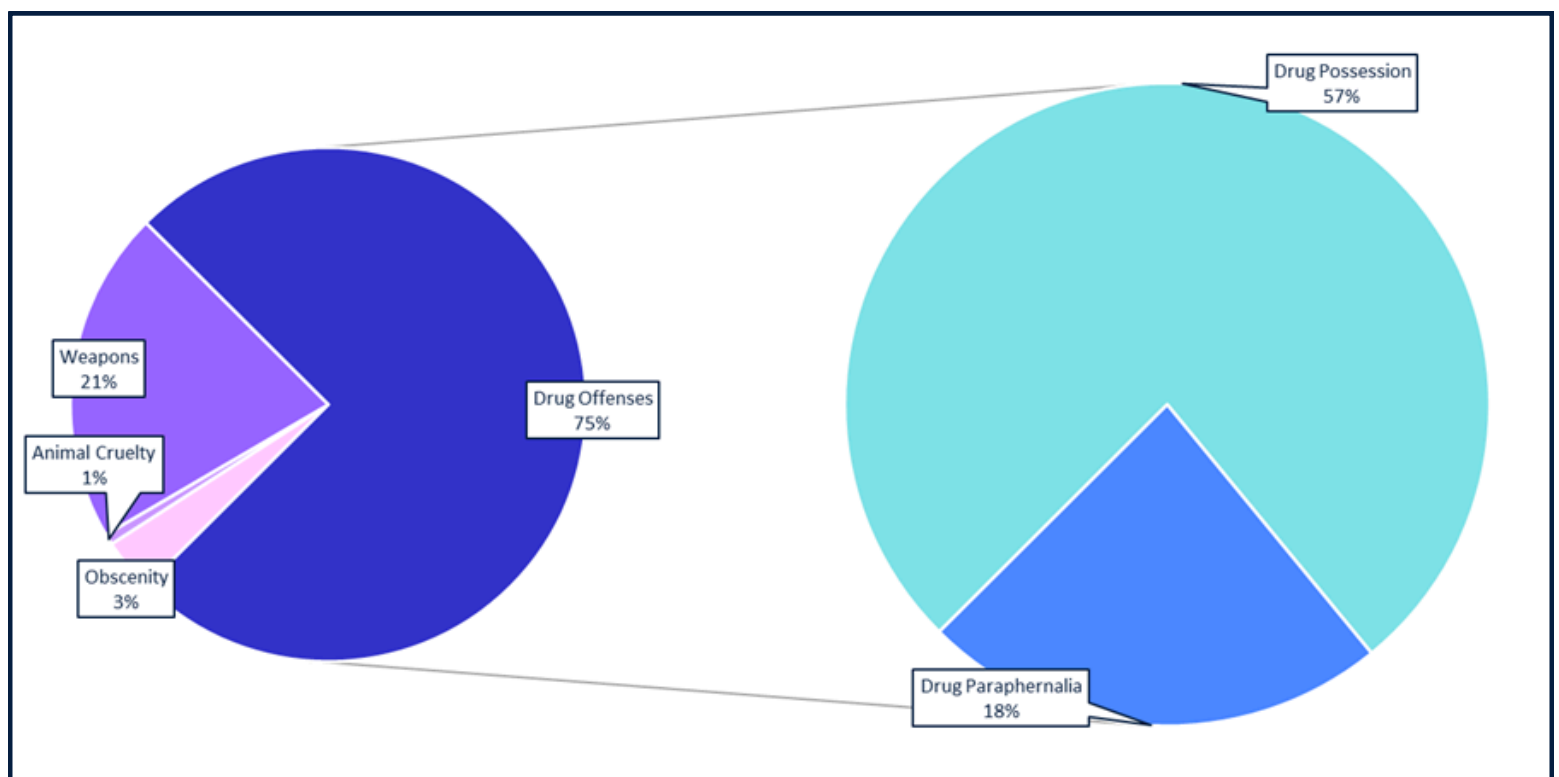

The total number of offenses in each NIBRS code name are represented in the pie chart below. The NIBRS code names with the largest number of reported incidents are all other offenses (which includes public intoxication), driving under the influence (DWI), and trespass of real property (trespass).

After the FBI's latest update, public intoxication arrests are no longer sorted into the "drunkness" category.
